The program was brought back to Union County with the help of Meacham Hams volunteer time and service to this valuable project. 5 participants were able to participate at the State Fair. Ryan Thomas from Union County had the overall winning ham for State. This was a great accomplishment for Union County.

Agriculture and Natural Resources

Union County is known not only for the quality of grain produced but also the quantity. Farmers started harvest for Union County in the early part of September and within a few days, yield contest entries were received. Being able to go out and supervise harvest provided an opportunity to meet with farmers during a time that is normally next to impossible.

I was able to reach out and help with harvest problems, discuss options for wintering their fields, and see what needed to be done within the county before next season. Some farmers needed help sourcing dryers or storage facilities while others needed help with rust and pests. The yield contest also provided a chance to work with farmers that hadn't been involved with University of Kentucky Cooperative Extension in a while. Between fifteen and twenty yield contest checks have taken place thus far and while it may not be as many as neighboring counties, it is more than were conducted I

The Union County Early Childhood Council has host annual for the past 10 years, "The Mouse in the House" math/literacy event The goal is to enable children and their families to increase literacy and math skill levels. The literacy and math skills are vital key skills that prepare the child throughout the school career. Developing these skills at an early age will help prepare them for their future. We have grown from this challenge and prepared ourselves on being creative in many aspects of keeping the traditional way but creating new ways to launch valuable information.

This year, booths were set up in a drive thru fashion and 200 + families were provided with information, books and healthy SNAP Ed recipes. The Union County Extension office prepared literacy skilled matching game to kindergarteners along with Nutritious information and recipes. Increasing literacy awareness and enhancing parental skills at home.

NUTRITION EDUCATION

Prior to the COVID-19 pandemic according to 2019 data from the Feeding America website, one in seven Kentuckians were food insecure and those aged 50-59 had the highest rate of food insecurity in the nation. During the pandemic, demand on food banks significantly increased as families faced layoffs and cutbacks at work. In response, during the 2020-2021 program year, 78% of SNAP-Ed and EFNEP Nutrition Education Program (NEP) Assistants reported partnering with local food banks to share recipes, newsletters and other materials and resources in food boxes. One SNAP-Ed Assistant reported delivering 100 Emergency Food Assistance cookbooks, 1,250 healthy and easy recipes, 300 Seasoned newsletters and 200 Healthy at Home newsletters to a local food pantry. A recipient said, "I was so happy to see recipes in my food box. Sometimes it's hard to think of ways to use some things you receive. These recipes will help me prepare healthier meals when feeding my family. Thank you." By partnering with food banks, NEP was able to reach hundreds of families throughout Kentucky.
